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

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



We've been working on it and talking about it for so long, I can't believe that Beauford Delaney and James Baldwin: Through the Unusual Door opens at the KMA in early February. Building a significant collection of works by Knoxville native Beauford Delaney has been a longstanding institutional goal. Late in 2017 we made a quantum leap in that direction by acquiring a dozen paintings and works on paper, one of the biggest and most significant art purchases in the museum's history. You might remember that we had a window of a few short weeks to raise close a million dollars, and the KMA community came through in the most

amazing and generous way. With that transformative purchase, together with the 40+ works the museum had already acquired, the KMA now owns more works by Beauford Delaney than any public collection in the world. I love saying that! The museum's holdings include several brilliant portraits of and works connected to the iconic writer and civil rights activist James Baldwin, which sparked the idea of organizing an exhibition aimed at expanding the scope of the artist's legacy guided by Baldwin's compelling words about Delaney, his friend and mentor.

This ambitious project, which includes a full-color catalogue being published by the University of Tennessee Press, has consumed Bernard E. and Barbara W. Bernstein Curator Stephen Wicks for the past few years, and has attracted generous support from a host of sponsors, listed on page 3. It's been wonderfully encouraging to receive such tangible endorsements of the KMA's curatorial direction from both national funding sources (who don't know us well) and our own stakeholders (who do). Through the Unusual Door draws from the KMA's rich holdings, public and private collections around the country, and unpublished archival material. This is the biggest project we've undertaken since the installation of Richard Jolley's epic glass-and-steel Cycle of Life in Ann and Steve Bailey Hall. Like Cycle of Life, the Delaney/Baldwin exhibition represents the highest and best expression of our mission as an institution dedicated to the visual culture of East Tennessee and its connections to the wider world, and sets a standard for the scale and ambition of how we want to operate in the future. Exhibition-related events and programs are listed in this edition of Canvas, including a lecture on April 7 by Columbia University professor and MacArthur Foundation Fellow Dr. Kellie Jones, part of the Sarah Jane Hardrath Kramer Lecture series.

Through the Unusual Door is part of a larger community-wide effort to reclaim <u>all</u> of Knoxville's creative history, operating under the umbrella of what we're calling "Gathering Light: The Delaney Project" and the leadership of KMA trustee Sylvia Peters. Soon after the exhibition opens, Marble City Opera will premiere a new chamber opera based on Beauford Delaney's life and art, and the University of Tennessee Humanities Center will present an international symposium on Beauford Delaney and James Baldwin. The Beck Cultural Exchange Center, Knoxville's African American museum, is raising funds to restore and repurpose the Delaney family home on Dandridge Avenue, and many more projects are in the works. The KMA is proud to take on a leadership role in this broadly-based initiative. The Delaney Project has the potential to open doors and chip away at some of the social, cultural, and racial barriers that separate segments of our community, and we think it will have widespread and long-lasting positive impact. It's something we need very much right now.

RECENT ACQUISITIONS

John Himmelfarb (Chicago 1946; lives and works in Chicago)

Noted Chicago-based artist John Himmelfarb is internationally known for his idiosyncratic modernist work in several media. Himmelfarb is deeply influenced by Abstract Expressionism and Pop Art, and is known for creating playful works informed by his interest in a diverse range of topics including language, industrialization, and urban sprawl. Like artists such as Red Grooms and Pablo Picasso, he is a master technician who goes to great lengths to make objects that appear spontaneous and impulsive.

Howard Hull has maintained an active studio practice in East Tennessee since the 1960s in addition to his work as a writer and arts educator. Late Summer represents Hull's interest in using views of rugged rural landscapes as points of departure for abstract compositions.

According to Hull, the structure of his paintings "is the result of growing up in Western Virginia. When I got up in the morning and walked outside and looked at my surroundings, I saw mountains in every direction...There seemed to be only a small strip of sky above the tops of them...The various shapes and colors of land formed below that strip of sky are so deeply embedded in my subconscious that they will probably always have an effect upon what I paint."

Beauford Delaney & James Baldwin Through the Unusual Door



Beauford Delaney and James Baldwin: Through the Unusual Door features 50+ paintings, works on paper, and unpublished archival material, and examines the 38-year relationship between painter Beauford Delaney (Knoxville 1901-1979 Paris) and writer James Baldwin (New York 1924-1987 Saint-Paul-de-Vence, France). The exhibition draws from the KMA's extensive Delaney holdings, public and private collections around the country, and rarely displayed papers held by the Delaney estate.

The exhibition title Through the Unusual Door comes from a passage in Baldwin's volume of collected essays The Price of the Ticket (1985) describing the author's reaction to his initial encounter with Delaney in the doorway of the artist's Greenwich Village studio: "Lord, I was to hear Beauford sing, later, and for many years, open the unusual door... I walked through that door into Beauford's colors." This first meeting encapsulates Delaney's transformational effect on Baldwin's view of himself and the world he lived in, and set the tone for the painter's role in the author's life as a father figure and mentor. Baldwin, in turn, inspired Delaney with his fearless social conscience and commitment to civil rights causes.

While no other figure in Beauford Delaney's extensive social orbit approaches James Baldwin in the extent and duration of influence, none of the major exhibitions of Delaney's work have explored in any depth the creative exchange between the two. Most studies of Delaney's art emphasize the influence of other modern masters on his development, his shift toward abstraction after moving to Paris in 1953, and his growing interest in the potential of color to convey light and dispel the shadows plaguing his inner world. Through the Unusual Door posits the idea that this profound stylistic change was in part inspired by the intellectual and personal relationship between Delaney and Baldwin. The exhibition incorporates previously unpublished archival materials and artworks that promise to extend the understanding of Delaney's aesthetic agenda and reveal the extent of his ties to Baldwin.

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

Dr. Kellie Jones, Professor in Art History and Archaeology at the Institute for Research in African American Studies at Columbia University

This annual event celebrates the life of Sarah Jane Hardrath Kramer and her passion for the visual arts and learning, and recognizes her many years of tireless, enthusiastic, and dedicated service to the Dulin Gallery of Art and the Knoxville Museum of Art.

Dr. Kellie Jones is Professor in Art History and Archaeology at the Institute for Research in African American Studies (IRAAS) at Columbia University. Dr. Jones has received numerous awards for her work from the Hutchins Center for African and African American Research, Harvard University; Creative Capital | Warhol Foundation Arts Writers Grant and a term as Scholar-in-Residence at the Terra Foundation for American Art in Europe in Giverny, France. In 2016 she was named a MacArthur Foundation Fellow. Dr. Jones is an authority on art of the African Diaspora, including the art of Beauford Delaney and other key African American modernists.





Going to Meet the Man by James Baldwin

"There's no way not to suffer. But you try all kinds of ways to keep from drowning in it." The men and women in these eight short fictions grasp this truth on an elemental level, and their stories, as told by James Baldwin, detail the ingenious and often desperate ways in which they try to keep their head above water. It may be the heroin that a down-and-out jazz pianist uses

to face the terror of pouring his life into an inanimate instrument. It may be the brittle piety of a father who can never forgive his son for his illegitimacy. Or it may be the screen of bigotry that a redneck deputy has raised to blunt the awful childhood memory of the day his parents took him to watch a black man being murdered by a gleeful mob.

By turns haunting, heartbreaking, and horrifying--and informed throughout by Baldwin's uncanny knowledge of the wounds racism has left in both its victims and its perpetrators--Going to Meet the Man is a major work by one of our most important writers.
