The Knoxville Museum of Art celebrates the art and artists of East Tennessee, presents new art and new ideas, serves and educates a diverse community, enhances Knoxville's quality of life and economic development, and operates ethically, responsibly, and transparently as a public trust.

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Among noteworthy recent acquisitions are three works gifted by longtime KMA benefactor Mary Hale Corkran. A native of Jefferson City, Tennessee, now living in Washington DC, she and her late husband Blair collected glass together for many years. *Red CFS* (circa 1986) by Joel Philip Myers represents the artist's signature approach to producing blown glass vessels featuring expressive combinations of vibrant color, abstract shape, and varying surface texture. He fuses a broad range of glass fragments onto the vessel's surface during the blowing process to produce arrangements resembling abstract expressionist paintings. Red CFS is currently on view in the KMA's ongoing *Facets* display on the garden level.

Long Leavers (1979) by minimalist sculptor Christopher Wilmarth reflects the talented mixed-media artist's use of refined architectural forms made of industrial materials. By the early 1970s, Wilmarth began producing hard-edged sculptures energized by the contrasting properties of dense sheet steel and luminous plate glass. Shaped only by a few cuts and bends, the raw sheet steel in Long Leavers (1979) suggests a soaring cathedral illuminated by a vertical slab of glass. Wilmarth brushes the glass with acid to produce a velvety surface that radiates a soft glow when lit. By avoiding any unnecessary decoration, the artist seeks to call attention to the rugged nature of his materials, to surrounding spaces, and most of all to the dramatic interplay of light and shadow. A related Wilmarth painting of the same title produced the following year represents the artist's exploration of the interaction of light and geometric forms in the alternative medium of watercolor. Long Leavers (1979) is now on view in the KMA's Currents exhibition on the third floor.

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As Knoxville's premier showplace for East Tennessee's rich and diverse visual culture, the KMA is proud this season to celebrate the achievement of native son Joseph Delaney. In recent years we've been rather singularly focused on building up our holdings by Joseph's brother Beauford, and the KMA can now boast more works by Beauford than any public collection in the world. That is a remarkable achievement and a testimony to the generosity of the many in our community who have supported this epic undertaking. The museum has owned and displayed important works by Joseph for decades, and it might appear

that we have been taking him a bit for granted lately. By organizing On the Move, which gathers from public and private collections around the country the best of Joseph's long artistic career, we hope to correct any perception that we've been favoring one brother over the other.

Anyone who's ever competed with a sibling can't help but wonder if Joseph and Beauford saw themselves as rivals, but the preponderance of evidence indicates that the two brothers loved and supported one another throughout their lives, even though they followed radically different paths. They shared strong bonds from childhood and both had to overcome difficult circumstances and systemic racism. Joseph heroically salvaged his brother's legacy when, after Beauford's death in 1979, he managed to get to Paris, collect the contents of Beauford's studio, and ship everything to America. Almost everything the KMA owns by Beauford was included in that precious shipment. Out in the world, Beauford enjoys the bigger reputation, but here in Knoxville, Joseph is by far the better-known Delaney: Beauford returned to Knoxville for only a few brief visits after he left in the 1920s, but Joseph came back to his hometown late in life and lived here for nearly a decade before his death in 1991. A lot of people locally knew him personally, own his works, and treasure his memory. If you didn't know "Joe," as he was known to his friends, On the Move will be a revelation.

On the Move and the projected 2020 exhibition dedicated to the relationship between Beauford and his best friend, writer and social activist James Baldwin, are parts of a larger communitywide effort to celebrate the life and achievements of the Delaney brothers, operating under the umbrella of what we're calling The Delaney Project and the leadership of KMA trustee Sylvia Peters. The East Tennessee Historical Society is spearheading efforts to place historical markers at the sites connected with the early years of Beauford and Joseph Delaney. The Beck Cultural Exchange Center, the museum dedicated to Knoxville's African-American history, has recently acquired the Delaney family home and is developing plans to restore and find an appropriate use for this important historic structure. Marble City Opera, a local independent company, has commissioned a chamber opera about Beauford's life that will premier in Knoxville in 2020. The Knoxville chapter of The Links, Incorporated, an organization of professional women of color, is assisting with fundraising and outreach. The Delaney Project has also enlisted the support and participation of faculty and staff from various units of the University of Tennessee. The Delaney Project has the potential to open doors and break down social, cultural, and racial barriers that separate segments of our community. We need this now more than ever.

Telling the story of what East Tennessee's artists have contributed to the world is fundamental of the KMA's mission and an important institutional priority. To that end, we are pleased to welcome DeLena Feliciano as the new assistant director of education. She will be helping Director of Education Rozz Martin with docent training, exhibition interpretation, public programming, and shaping the visitor experience. You might remember DeLena as visitor services manager and volunteer coordinator. Her former duties have been taken over by current KMA staff Jonathan Hash and Chelsea Lloyd respectively, and we welcome them to their new roles.

Joseph Delaney On the Move


Knoxville-born Joseph Delaney (1904-1991) rose from humble beginnings to establish himself as a tireless and prolific painter of Manhattan's urban scene. Over the span of his 60-year career, Delaney displayed a remarkable ability to express the city's vitality using the loose brushwork of gestural abstraction, which at the time represented the cutting edge of studio practice, without sacrificing the narrative content many of his contemporaries had abandoned. The works featured in On the Move represent the variety of ways in which he used this hybrid method to infuse his painted scenes with vibrant energy and intricate patterns of movement. While capturing the ebb and flow of life on the boulevards and back alleys, Delaney's vigorous brushwork also reveals his restless spirit and insatiable creative drive.

The works in On the Move reflect the many ways Joseph Delaney returned again and again to the concept of motion. A series of early biographical watercolors reconstructs memorable episodes in the Delaney family's sojourn through East Tennessee during the artist's childhood. In countless female nude ink studies, the artist uses masterfully economical contours of varying width and speed to strike a balance between anatomical accuracy and evocative distortion. In portraits, he seeks poses and expressions that convey fleeting, intimate encounters captured midgesture. In depicting Manhattan's urban scenes, the artist trains his ever-shifting vantage point on gleaming plazas and gritty nightspots with equal intensity and familiarity. In some compositions, near-panoramic views emphasize the pulse of crowds within vast architectural arenas. In others, the artist focuses on specific urban structures—subway cars, bridges, and roadways-that make movement possible.


Combining elements of narrative description and expressive abstraction, Joseph Delanev produced a consistent, substantial, and ambitious body of work that honors his strong academic foundation while incorporating modernist techniques responsible for reshaping the artistic landscape of his day. The artist's inventive compositions vividly capture New York City's turbulent character in a manner that also conveys in bold terms his passion for the physical act of painting. On the Move has been organized by the KMA in the hopes of generating newfound appreciation and scholarly attention for an artist who captured his time and place with uncommon energy and a fiercely independent spirit.
